As we begin, here is a quote I would like you to consider. Can you guess who said it?



"Men by their constitutions are naturally divided into two parties.

- 1. Those who fear and distrust the people and wish to draw all powers from them into the hands of the higher classes.
- Those who identify themselves with the people, have confidence in them, cherish and <u>consider them as the most honest and safe</u>, although not the wisest depository of the public interests."

"In every country these two parties exist, and in every one where they are free to think, speak, and write, they will declare themselves. Call them, therefore ... by whatever name you please, they are the same parties still and pursue the same object." Who said that?

Thomas Jefferson wrote this around 1824.

His presidency ran from 1801-1809.

So, 15 years after serving as president, this was his view, his 2020 hindsight for what was true of men and governments. The same is still true today. No matter how things change, some things stay the same. Sacred writings tell us,

"There is nothing new under the sun."

As we begin, let us be aware of one of the great constants in life. <u>Human Nature!</u> When our Founders met to determine what kind of government would ensure the safety and freedom of "the people," they understood and took into account man's human nature with its tendencies and failings. Therefore, they put in "checks and balances" because they knew that man was:

- Prone to be greedy
- Easily corrupted by power
- Self-interested, in other words, he would take care of himself first before they take care of others.




We do not have to look very far to see how government is running today. I call it B & B. Not Bed and Breakfast, but <u>Bribes and Blackmail</u>.

As we study how government works, it will be helpful to remember that B & B is actively at work at all levels of government. We would love to believe that our politicians have our best interests at heart, but that for the most part would be a delusion. Fortunately, we do have some, I say some, that are serving for the right reasons. As Precinct Chairs, we should endeavor to search out the good ones and Primary out the bad ones.

Rep. Thomas Massie of Kentucky: **"Government is whatever the people in** power can get away with, and whatever the people they govern ... will tolerate." Here are <u>Jefferson's 16 Principles of Government</u>. "The principles of Jefferson are the axioms of a free society." Abraham Lincoln

As you are "About to enter, fellow citizens, on the exercise of duties which comprehend everything dear and valuable to you, it is proper that you should understand what I deem the essential principles of our government, and consequently those which ought to shape its administration. will compress them within the narrowest compass they will bear, stating the general principle, but not all sits limitations.

Jefferson's 16 Principles

- Equal and exact justice <u>for all men</u>, of whatever state or persuasion, religious or political.
- Peace, commerce, and honest friendship with all nations, entangling alliances with <u>none</u>.
- 3. The support of the <u>State</u> governments in all their rights, as the <u>most competent</u> administrations for our domestic concerns and the surest bulwarks against antirepublican tendencies.
- 4. The preservation of the general government in its whole <u>constitutional</u> <u>vigor</u>, as the sheet anchor of our peace at home and safety abroad.

So, what is a "sheet anchor?"

Sheet anchors are the largest, strongest and heaviest anchors carried by ships. They are carried towards the waist of the ships and used as spares in emergencies. On Calynda, my grandfather's sailboat, we carried two of these. In a hurricane we would row out and set these to keep us from swinging into other boats when the winds shifted. A knowledge of the Constitution will see us through the changing winds of political thought.





5. A jealous care of the right of <u>election</u>

6. Absolute acquiescence in the <u>decisions</u>

<u>of the majority</u>, the vital principle of republics, from which there is no appeal but to force, the vital principle and immediate parent of despotism.

What is despotism?



<u>Despotism</u> (from Noah Webster's 1828 Dictionary)

Absolute power; authority unlimited and uncontrolled by men, constitutions or laws, and depending alone on the will of the prince;

<u>Despotism</u> is often marked by tyranny which is the abusive exercise of arbitrary power, often with unjust and oppressive severity. It is the exercise of power over others not permitted by law or requiring justice.

"When the people fear the government, there is tyranny. When the government fears the people, there is liberty." -Thomas Jefferson


7. A well-disciplined <u>militia</u>, our best reliance in peace and for the moments of war, 'til <u>regulars</u> may relieve them.
8. The supremacy of the <u>civil over the military</u> authority.


It may become necessary in the future to explore what the Founders meant by militia and regulars.

Cumulative Inflation






11. Encouragement of <u>agriculture</u>, and of commerce as its handmaid.12. The diffusion of information and the

How are we doing? Do we trust our elections?




