Chair Kris Coons called the meeting to order at 9:00 am.

Invocation

The thoughtful invocation was delivered by **Bexar GOP** Chaplain Anita Kegley.

Pledge of Allegiance

Chair Coons led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance to the US and Texas flags.

Introductions

Chair Coons introduced the elected officials and candidates present:

Anita Kegley and Patty Gibbons, both candidates for San Antonio City Council D1, were introduced and both made brief remarks.

Fourth Court of Appeals Justice-elect Todd McCray joined the meeting later and was recognized.

Mike Wheeler, Kendall County Chair and SREC 25 Committeeman, addressed the group and emphasized the primary responsibility of the Republican Party of Texas is to support candidates and to fundraise. He urged the members of the Texas House of Representatives to conform to Republican caucus rules and elect Representative David Cook Speaker of the House. It is important for Republicans to respect the rules and demonstrate unity. He discussed the tremendous victory by President Trump and the Fourth Court of Appeals.

Quico Canseco, SREC 26 Committeeman, also emphasized the importance of unity in the Republican Party and for the Republican House caucus to respect the outcome of its vote to support Representative David Cook as Speaker. "A house divided cannot stand". We need to elect more Republicans to office and cannot be divided over small differences but rather focus on the 80% on which we agree.

Determination of Quorum

Republican Party of Texas (RPT) Rule 9 states at least one fourth of the membership shall constitute a quorum. There are currently 236 precinct chairmen so 59 members are required for a quorum. It was confirmed 66 members were in attendance, so a quorum is present.

Chairman's Remarks

Chair Kris Coons wished everyone a Merry Christmas and Happy Holidays. She thanked everyone for their hard work and efforts in making this such a successful election cycle in Bexar County. She expressed appreciation to the precinct chairmen, judges, clerks and poll workers who do so much for the Party. She also recognized the courage and sacrifice of those candidates who ran but did not win. We hope to see you again!

Donald Trump received 56.2% of the vote in Texas. There were 760,000 votes cast in Bexar County. The successes we have achieved are due to Republicans coming together to support all our candidates. It is in this spirit of unity and the importance of Republicans uniting, that she issued a statement yesterday regarding the Texas Speaker race (**Attachment A**).

Chair Coons offered congratulations to all our victorious candidates and emphasized the importance of the victories on the Fourth Court of Appeals. She announced the swearing in of the new Justices will be January 1, 2-4 pm at San Fernando Cathedral. Chair Coons then summarized the accomplishments of the RPBC in support of the candidates in a short 158 days.

She stated her administration is planning for the May 3, 2025 COSA elections and are aggressively planning now for the elections in 2026 and 2028.

In the COSA City Council elections, there are 20 candidates for Mayor. Currently, the Republicans are Rolando Pablos, Clayton Perry, Andrew Vincencio and Dr. Tim Westley.

There will be a candidate meeting January 8 to share the information and support available from RPBC. This is a meeting for candidates and the executive staff only. A report will be sent out after the meeting.

In planning for 2025 and 2026, under the leadership of Terri Richardson and Curt Nelson, there will be a total of 59 offices, including 40 Judicial positions and two County Commissioner seats.

Chair Coons and Vice Chair Sinclair then presented a power point presentation summarizing a snapshot of the statistical analysis of Bexar County voters and results in the November elections.

Approval of Minutes

Secretary Diane Rath stated additional precinct chairs have joined the meeting, and the quorum is now 74.

The draft minutes for the September 28, 2024, CEC meeting were distributed electronically with the call for this meeting. Chair Coons asked if there were any amendments to the minutes. Hearing none, the minutes were approved as distributed.

Finance Report (Attachment B)

Paula Villagran, Precinct 3203, presented the Finance Report for Treasurer Lille Gough. Revenue YTD (July 1-Nov 30) is \$254,161.26 and Expenses are \$137,135.45. This is well ahead of the Budgeted amounts. Cash on hand is \$117,126.01 compared with \$4,200 when this Administration came into office. Sustaining membership continues to

increase with 138 currently donating monthly. YTD contributions are \$21,540 which is 45% of the annual budget.

Richard Briscoe, Precinct 3078, expressed his appreciation to Treasurer Lille Gough for her continual distribution and details in the finance reports.

Ratification Precinct Chairmen

There are seven prospective precinct chairmen to be ratified.

Laurie Baird, Precinct 4121, moved ratification of the precinct chairmen announced and Steven Jordan, Precinct 3105, seconded the motion. The motion was approved without dissent.

Chair Coons administered the Oath of Office to the newly ratified precinct chairmen. Three newly elected precinct chairmen are present. The quorum required is now 61 and 69 are present.

Election of Contested Precinct Chairmen

There are no contested precinct chairmen.

Announcements

Vice Chairman Kyle Sinclair explained the Electoral College and the process that truly elects the President **since the winner is not determined by a national popular vote**. The electors are elected in Congressional Caucus at the State Convention of each Party. Whichever Presidential candidate wins **the state's majority of popular votes** determines which party's slate of electors meets to cast their ballots. The meeting in Texas will take place December 17 in the Capitol. The event is open to the public. Vice Chairman Sinclair is an elector from his Congressional District **20**.

Ken Muenzler, Pct 4034, inquired why the RPT does not publicize the names of the electors. Chair Coons responded one explanation could be for security reasons, as sometimes threats are made.

David Westbrook, Pct 1107, inquired for Vice Chairman Sinclair to again state the time and location of the Elector Meeting.

Tracy Ebersole, Pct 2111, emphasized the importance of just one vote in an election and referenced the recent Balcones Heights mayoral election which was decided by one vote.

Patricia Gutting, Pct 1108, had an inquiry about the presentation, regarding the success of Congressman Gonzales's election.

Chair Coons announced the next CEC meeting is March 22, 2025 at 9am. She asked the group to please check the **BexarGOP** calendar regularly and to sign on the web site and all social media. In addition, all Precinct Chairs please sign on the Facebook page for the Republican Party of Bexar County Precinct Chairs group page.

Carl Merkle, Pct 4096, expressed his belief in the importance of Christian values in our government policies and asked for anyone interested in forming a Christian Coalition to contact him.

Anita Kegley, Precinct 2134, shared information about the January 2, 2025, Church and Politics event which is primarily a planning event to be followed by a Mega Breakfast on February 14. (**Attachment C**)

Cesario Garcia, COSA District 8 candidate, announced his campaign kick-off will be January 18th at the new Lion & Rose on IH 10 West.

John Austin, Precinct 3047, shared the sad news that Edgar Morales, long-time grassroots activist and founder of the **Alamo** Pachyderm Club, has passed away.

Chair Coons shared that Patsy Light, longtime Republican volunteer and supporter, passed away recently.

Dylan Young, Precinct 3088, discussed the movie *2000 Mules* and the information it presents regarding election fraud.

Randolph Macias, Precinct 3036, shared several results in elections nationally where conservative candidates were victorious.

Curt Nelson, Precinct 3104, encouraged people to attend the elector meeting December 17. He reminded us of the need to re-up as a deputy registrar for 2025 and the need to register voters in our churches.

Karen Marshall, SREC 26 Committeewoman, (**Attachment D**), shared information from the most recent SREC meeting. The Precinct Chairman's Handbook has been revised and will soon be available. She commended Lucy Trainer, SD 25 SREC Committeewoman, for proposing the resolution prohibiting counties from paying private companies to register voters. She shared her resolution thanking all volunteers for working the election. Also, the SREC urged all state representatives to follow the will of the caucus in voting in the House Speaker's race. Richard Briscoe, Precinct 3078, discussed the Electoral College's history and its importance.

Allen Hamilton, Precinct 3102, (**Attachment E**) invited the group to the Inauguration Party sponsored by the Network for Patriots on January 20 at the new Lion & Rose on IH 10 West at 10am.

Robert Gonzalez, Precinct 2040, requested the list of Precinct 2 Precinct Chairmen and asked anyone from Precinct 2 to contact him. He discussed the need for more Republican candidates.

Cheryl Hagenson, Precinct 4106, moved to congratulate Chair Kris Coons for the unity of the Party and the successes in the election. She stated she has heard many people comment on the new tone and accomplishments under Coons' leadership. There were multiple seconds to the motion, and it passed without objection.

Steve Jordan, Precinct 3105, moved to adjourn the meeting with multiple seconds.

Chair Coons adjourned the meeting at 10:42.

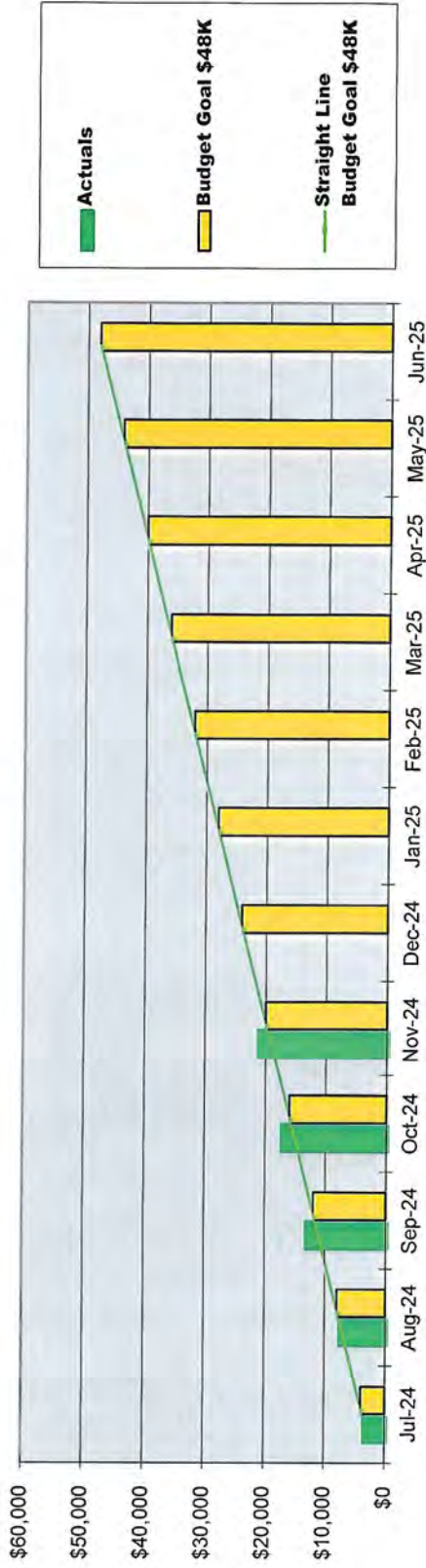

**Resolution Encouraging the Texas Legislature to Prohibit
Counties from Expending Taxpayer Funds to Pay
Private Companies to Register Voters**

WHEREAS, the Texas Constitution mandates the responsible use of taxpayer funds, ensuring that public monies are spent in a manner that is transparent, accountable, and in the best interest of Texas citizens; and

WHEREAS, Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton filed separate lawsuits in October 2024 against Bexar and Travis Counties for engaging in the practice of hiring private companies to conduct voter registration efforts at the expense of local taxpayers; and

WHEREAS, the act of using taxpayer funds to pay private companies for voter registration services raises concerns about the proper use of public money, accountability, and the potential for partisan bias in voter registration activities; and

WHEREAS, counties, through their commissioners' courts, have a responsibility to ensure that taxpayer dollars are spent efficiently and for purposes that directly benefit the public good; and

WHEREAS, voter registration is a fundamental civic duty and, as such, should be carried out in a non-partisan and transparent manner, ensuring the integrity of the election process and the fair and equal treatment of all eligible voters; and

WHEREAS, the use of taxpayer funds to pay private companies to conduct voter registration could lead to conflicts of interest and undermine the public's trust in the fairness and impartiality of the electoral process; and

WHEREAS, taxpayers should not bear the financial burden of private organizations that may not operate in a manner consistent with the principles of non-partisan and fair election practices; and

WHEREAS, Senator Paul Bettencourt has pre-filed SB 511 and Representative Tom Oliverson has pre-filed the companion bill HB 1489 for the 89th Legislative Session to prohibit the use of public funds to facilitate the distribution, by a third party, of voter registration applications to persons who did not request them; now

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Republican Party of Texas urges the Texas Legislature to pass legislation that prohibits counties, through their commissioners' courts, from expending taxpayer funds to pay private companies to register voters; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this legislation should ensure that voter registration activities are carried out directly by government entities in a manner that is transparent, impartial, and free from conflicts of interest; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Republican Party of Texas stands in support of efforts to protect the integrity of the Texas electoral process and ensure that public funds are used responsibly and for the benefit of all Texas taxpayers.

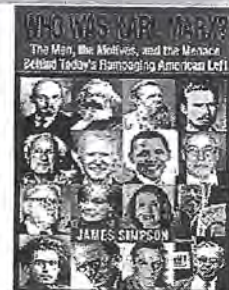
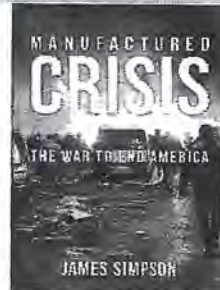
